## Why Your Work Matters

This summary is for the builders, weavers, and doers who are shaping rural and Indigenous well-being and building community wealth from within. Yet funding gaps, siloed systems, and top-down policies often ignore the expertise of rural and Indigenous practitioners.

# **Core Insight**

Well-being doesn't happen just from services focusing on health. Lasting change comes from building trust, connecting siloed sectors, and investing in local leadership, voice, and infrastructure. **You** are central to this work and deserve tools, resources, and relationships supporting your efforts.

## **Key Practitioner Recommendations**

#### **Lead Local Conversations That Spark Action**

- Start small with committed individuals and **build momentum**.
- Model community engagement and decision-making that reflects local values and voice.

#### **Build Trust Before Scaling Initiatives**

- Invest time in relationships not just for funding, but for shared understanding.
- Embrace a "lead from behind" approach: listen first, then support existing energy.

#### **Create On-Ramps to Leadership**

- Engage those who are often left out with low-barrier, welcoming opportunities.
- Redefine leadership to include diverse skills, lived experience, and new faces.

#### Design from Within, Not for

- Co-create programs and partnerships with community members, not just for them.
- Use storytelling and shared data collection to define success and adapt strategies.

#### **Build and Leverage Networks**

- Facilitate physical and virtual spaces for collaboration.
- Connect across rural, Indigenous, and regional peers to share learning and solidarity.

#### **Push for Better Metrics and Terms**

- Track what truly matters: well-being, equity, and systemic change not just outputs.
- Work to find ways for these metrics to work for each funding source.
- Advocate for flexible metrics and reporting structures that reflect your reality.

#### What's Next?

You are already doing the work. This is about resourcing, recognizing, and strengthening what you're building. Use these insights to advocate for your community's needs and connect with others walking the same path.
